- 2. Think about your career as a Sociology student. Tell me about the strategies you have used that you believe have really helped you learn sociology, understand the sociological imagination, and so on. (probes: How do you prepare for class? How would you describe your study style? How often do you miss class? How often and in what ways do you interact with your sociology peers? Faculty? How important is doing the reading assignments? Are there any particular experiences you would mention here?)
- 3. We often learn things outside of class. What types of out-of-class learning experiences have been helpful in learning sociology? Do you ever attend soc club meetings? Have you engaged in research with a faculty member? Do you go to hear research presentations on campus? Do you do volunteer work? To what organizations do you belong? How have these experiences influenced your learning of Sociology?
